## UNEQUAL PAY FOR EQUAL WORK.

#### from Label Letter

In 2010, Kohler Co. adopted a two-tier wage scale; it was a dark time for workers and companies alike. But more than a decade later, the two—tier system was still in place and workers were resentful. In 2015, UAW members at the bath and kitchen manufacturer went on a more than month-long strike that successfully narrowed the gap in the two-tier system, but they couldn't close it entirely. That was until 2020 when the company and the union opened new contract negotiations. In December, Kohler agreed to a new five-year contract that phases out the two-tiered wage scale by 2023. The agreement negotiated a year ahead of schedule, benefitted Kohler and workers, bringing the younger workers' pay and benefits up and helping the company find workers in a competitive labor market.

"If you're not equal in pay, you're not equal," said Kevin Bradshaw a Kellogg worker and vice president of BCTGM Local 252G. "We're fighting corporate greed because none of these companies asking for a two-tier system actually need it; they just want it. Time has run out on giving companies big concessions, settling for things and not fighting back.

Last, month I made a request for support of our members at UAW Local 128 in Troy, OH who had been locked out by their employer Collins Aerospace. I'm proud to report that thanks to the incredible members of Region 2B, we were able to collect \$30,000 to be distributed to these brothers and sisters.

Fortunately, the membership of this local was able to come to an agreement with the company on March 14 and have since returned to work. Thank you all so much for supporting one another.

They have managed to get legislation passed that allows workers to refuse to pay union dues and still receive the same representation, pay and benefits as those who pay dues. In other words, to freeload at the expense of their fellow workers.

Today they have joined forces with another organization called the "Freedom Foundation". Their goal is the same. They distribute publications telling workers that unions have a strangle hold on workers, forcing them to pay dues money that they could be using to purchase gasoline, groceries, and their rent, among other things.

It costs money to negotiate collective bargaining agreements. It costs money to hold corporations accountable to the language the parties agreed to.

If they limit the funding unions receive, they can limit the union's ability to defend workers when they are unfairly treated.

So, remember these two organizations. Ask your representatives where they stand on these two antiunion busting organizations before you cast your vote.

## Financial Conference

I would like to thank the membership for sending me to the Financial Officers Conference in New Orleans LA. There were approximately 700 delegates at the conference.

The first day was kicked off with Region 8, which has 21 states, director Mitchell Smith. They had 8 locals on strike in two years and some of our union brothers and sisters survived a tornado. After the tornado in Kentucky, the UAW put out a donation request for our brothers and sisters. There was \$130,000 donated from UAW locals across the country.

Director Smith talked about Article 2 of the UAW Constitution. Article 2 states the objectives of the UAW. Section 1: to improve the working conditions, create a uniform system of shorter working hours, higher wages, health care and pensions, to maintain and protect the interest of workers under the jurisdiction of this International Union.

If you remember some months ago, we voted on a referendum to the constitution. Out of 1,310,650 members, 143,072 voted, that is only 14%. Many International ballots were returned, due to wrong addresses. If you recall seeing a posting on the union board about the local needing your correct address, this would be why. Please call the hall at 419-784-5399, to give us your correct address so you receive future mailings from the local and international.

Vice President of Ford, Chuck Browning said,"It's hard to hire someone right now, because what used to be careers, are jobs now. This is due to lack of pay and benefits." This was not just the big 3.

VP of GM, Terry Dittes, who has announced his retirement spoke. He said," It's an honor and privilege to serve this great membership." He also advised that our membership see us, hear us and we need to listen.

President Ray Curry thanked the front line workers during the pandemic. There are some changes coming in the UAW. For too long the companies have pitted us union members against each other. President Curry talked about how the executive board is committed to building an ethical reform and a stronger UAW.

Secretary Treasurer Frank Struglin gave an update on the strike fund. The strike fund has increased for the past 3 years. The strike fund was \$830,000,000 at the beginning of the year. When the fund reaches


\$850 million, our dues will decrease to 2 hours pay.

As many have seen, workers are voting for unions in places that were not expected. Recently we have seen Starbucks voting in a union. The most recent was Amazon workers in Staten Island, NY. This was a major victory.



# STATEMENT OF UAW PRESIDENT RAY CURRY ON KEEPING IMPORTANT PROVISIONS TO PROTECT THE MANUFACTURING SUPPLY CHAIN IN THE COMPETES ACT DELIBERATIONS. From UAW.org

Congress has an opportunity to pass historic legislation that will strengthen domestic auto manufacturing for UAW members, their families and their communities to make our supply chains more resilient for decades to come.

The UAW supports supply chain resilience provisions in the House-passed COMPETES Act and, in the strongest possible terms, urges House and Senate conferees to include it in the final agreement so President Biden can sign it into law. These provisions would aid the Biden Administrations' important work to strengthen our supply chains. We thank Energy and Commerce Chairman Frank Pallone, Congresswoman Debbie Dingell, Congressman Adam Kinzinger, Congressman Tom Malinowski, and other members of the committee for crafting this bi-partisan legislation that stands to help the nation avert future supply chain crises.

The ongoing semiconductor shortage has led to hardship for UAW members, their families and their communities including layoffs and shift cancellations throughout the country. UAW members who build world class light duty vehicles, heavy duty vehicles, agricultural equipment, and parts have suffered due in large part to our over reliance on foreign supply chains. Fortunately, the \$52 billion in funding for semiconductors included in both the COMPETES Act and the Senate-passed USICA bill, along with the \$45 billion loan guarantee and grant program for the manufacturing critical technologies, and other measures, stand to benefit US workers' and our economy, while also leaving us in a superior position to withstand future global supply chain disruptions.
