On May 11, 2022 Rob Egnor and I attended the 61st Annual Award Luncheon for the Richard T. Gosser Scholarship Program. Twelve outstanding high school seniors from Region 2B UAW families have been awarded \$10,000 college scholarships through this program. Local 211 is proud to announce that we had two winners; Chelsie Nicole Porter from Defiance, her father Wayne Porter works at the GM facility and Gavin Charles Askins from Tinora, his father Charles Askins also works at the GM facility. These two participants are the 29th and 30th Scholarship Winners for Local 211 since 1987.

Including the 2021-2022 winners, 392 students have received Gosser scholarships. An additional 151 students have received runner-up scholarships. GM Powertrain alone has received \$231,000.00 since 1989; that is something to be extremely proud

of with our members' children. In all, \$3,118,000 in scholarships has been awarded since the program began in 1962.

The warmer weather is finally here. Along with the warm weather comes maintenance to prepare for it. Pulling the glass out of the screen doors and putting the screens back

in, air conditioners in windows and the boat ready for the water. Just make sure to take the necessary precautions while doing your pre-summer chores and get a hand when needed to help prevent any unnecessary injuries so you can enjoy the summer.

Although COVID-19 is still around, we have had a light number of cases here at the plant and have been out of masks for a few months now. As long as Defiance County stays low in COVID-19 cases and we do not have a major outbreak in the plant, we will not have to go back to wearing masks. Please continue to use caution when you are out in public and at family gatherings to stay healthy.

Here at the plant we currently have 426 members on the rolls. We recently had 8 production members transfer to Defiance through the Appendix A process while also converting 2 temporary employees to permanent status. These are not the only new faces that we have encountered here in Defiance. We have also added 3 new Pattern Makers, 1 new Electrician Journeyman and on June 6, 2 Electrician Apprentices. We should be seeing more new members coming to the plant in the near future, the plant is currently conducting interviews for the remaining skilled trades openings so please take a minute to make these new team members feel welcome if you see them.

Week ending June 12, 2022 there will be a \$1000 bonus payment for all eligible team members. This is another benefit that was negotiated by our International UAW, so look for this on your check and let us know if you did not receive it and we will see what happened.

I recently announced that we were notified by the Regional UAW office that the next International Executive Board meeting will be at the end of June. This is where the next step in the review process of our proposed 2019 local agreement should occur. As soon as we hear something back on the IEB's findings, it will be communicated to the membership. This is and has been the hot button item for the last few months. I want to thank you for your patience once again during this process.

Thank you once again for being the hard working brothers and sister you have always been. Please be safe at what you do and remember to lock out your equipment. We are very proud workers here and make a point to get our work done so we can provide quality products to our customers. UAW IPS Conference in Las Vegas, NV 2022

On behalf of fellow Chairmen Victor Maag from Powers and Sons unit and Josh Brock, from Johns Manville unit we would like to thank the membership for allowing us to represent you at the UAW 2022 National IPS Conference in Las Vegas, Nevada.

While trying to dodge a sandstorm and outrageous prices on products and places to eat, here are a few things learned.

Director Ron McInroy reminded us that we need to represent our people and it is not a "I" thing, it is a "WE" thing. He told us that the current board took out all the corrupt members, not the government; and the current board stopped the bleeding of 5.3 million dollars a year.

Vice President Terry Dittes talked about President Joe Biden possibly being the most Union friendly President we have ever had and that he is fighting for Unions.

We heard an electric vehicle presentation from Jason Wade, IPS research department. He said in the next 10 years half of the vehicles manufactured will probably be electric or hybrid. He also said studies have shown that the transition to BEV's could have a significant negative impact on Auto Workers. He thinks that maybe a million jobs could be affected., and that the shift will have a substantial impact on the parts sector.

We kept hearing the term "There's a movement going on in this Country right now"

Vice President Cindy Estrada reminded us that Starbucks and Amazon workers are organizing. Vice President Chuck Browning asked how many work for companies that have recently asked to open their contract up early and raise their wages. Which means...they could have given you that in your last contract and did not. He talked about how they got a deal for John Deere and they are still making record profit.

\*China is leading in the Battery Supply Chain and by 2024 it is projected that they will have 70% of the worlds battery market.

\* American billionaires got 1.7 trillion dollars

richer during the Pandemic and all of it was tax free!

\* Coca Cola's profits went up to 64% even though sales were down and had layoffs and the Executives got bonuses.

All in all, it's been a tough last couple of years! It feels like it's going to get a little tougher, so we just need to get a little stronger!

# Recreation Committee Upcoming Events:



# 23 Surprising 4th of July Facts

- 1. The Declaration of Independence was not signed on July 4, 1776. That's actually the day it was formally adopted by the Continental Congress, but it wasn't signed by most signatories until August.
- 2. American typically eat 150 million hot dogs on Independence Day, "enough to stretch from D.C. to L.A. more than five times," according to the National Hot Dog and Sausage Council.
- 3. Three presidents have died on July 4: Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, and James Monroe.
- 4. John Adams believed that American independence should be celebrated on July 2, as that's the actual day the Continental Congress voted for independence in 1776.

- 5. Annoyed that Independence Day wasn't celebrated on July 2, Adams reportedly turned down invitations to July 4 celebrations throughout his life.
- 6. Massachusetts became the first state to make the 4th of July an official state holiday in 1781.
- 7. President Zachary Taylor died in 1850 after eating spoiled fruit at a July 4 celebration.
- 8. The famed Macy's fireworks show in New York City uses more than 75,000 fireworks shells and costs about \$6 million.
- 9. Nathan's Famous Hot Dog Eating Contest is held annually on July 4. In 2018, champion Joey Chestnut ate 74 hot dogs with buns in just 10 minutes.
- 10. Independence Day became a federal holiday in 1870.
- 11. As of 2016, July 4 was the number one holiday for beer sales in the U.S., according to the National Beer Wholesalers Association.
- 12. In 1778, George Washington gave his soldiers a double ration of rum to celebrate the July 4 holiday.
- 13. Every July 4, descendants of the signers of the Declaration of Independence tap the Liberty Bell 13 times in honor of the original 13 colonies.
- 14. Eating salmon is a July 4 tradition in parts of New England.
- 15. Small towns in the U.S. typically spend between \$8,000 and \$15,000 on their fireworks displays.
- 16. President Calvin Coolidge was born on July 4, 1872.
- 17. About 16,000 July 4 fireworks displays happen around the country each year, according to the American Pyrotechnics Association.
- 18. With many fireworks shows canceled in 2020 due to COVID-19, the American Pyrotechnics Association is asking for financial help from Congress to keep family-run fireworks businesses afloat.
- 19. Starting in 1818, new stars and stripes were added to the American flag each July 4 to make the creation of new states.
- 20. The U.S. Flag Code offers guidelines for flying the flag on July 4, and every day.
- 21. John Hancock has the largest signature on the Declaration of Independence.
- 22. The first July 4 celebrations took place at the White House on 1801, hosted by Thomas Jefferson.
- 23. One World Trade Center in New York is 1,776 feet tall to mark the year the U.S. declared its independence from Britain.
